Keeping up with Grace's building

Recent projects improve safety and efficiency

Grace's Property Manager Dan Muriello supervises the maintenance and repair of the Grace building. Here's his report on some recent projects and on some of the work that will be done over the summer.

LED lighting. Grace is taking advantage of a ComEd Energy Efficiency Program which offers cash incentives for energyefficient lighting, including fixture replacements and retrofits. Fluorescent fixtures in the music office, the AV center (the room above the church library), and inside the elevator have been converted to LED lighting. LED light bulbs are significantly more efficient than fluorescents and last much longer.

Kitchen stairs. Go past the school and church office desks, through the Lamb door, down the stairs, and turn right. This is the much-used shortcut into Fellowship Hall and the kitchen. Grace member Ken Folgers recently rebuilt the stairs here. The new stairs have sturdy handrails and rubber treads to make them safe for all who hurry through this back way.

Roof and masonry repairs. Half of the Grace organ was recently removed to accommodate roof repairs above the organ chambers, followed by plastering and painting inside these spaces. The pipes were cleaned and reinstalled and will no longer covered with falling plaster dust.

In the weeks ahead, various outside walls will receive new tuckpointing, including the outside wall of the organ loft, the parapet





above the music office, and the wall over the Division Street door. Once the outside is fixed, plaster will be repaired and repainted on the interior. Ceilings in the music office and school's Learning Center will also get the plaster-and-paint treatment over the summer.

New sconces outside the Bonnie Brae entrance. The decorative fixtures at the main entrance to the atrium have been absent since they were vandalized in 2009. New ones have been installed that match the sconces in the Memorial Garden and Fellowship Hall.

Safety issues. Prompted by a state law regulating public school buildings, Dan plans to install carbon monoxide detectors in Grace's three boiler rooms and in the kitchen. These will provide an early warning system for the presence of carbon monoxide.

Lead testing. State law regarding school buildings mandates lead-testing of water from all faucets and fountains that could be used for drinking and cooking. If, after testing, the lead content is found to exceed the maximum allowable level as determined by the EPA, the most common response is replacement of the fixtures. Samples from approximately 40 fixtures throughout the building will be included in the testing.

The Grace Church library is constantly adding new books to the collection. Recent additions include a new title by the generous and funny essayist Anne Lamott; a copy of "Waking Up White," the book on institutional racism discussed by small groups at Grace during Lent; and several new books and resources celebrating this year's 500th anniversary of the Reformation. Look for these titles and more in the cabinet in the atrium as well as on display in the library.

Volunteers staff the library on Sunday mornings. Stop by to browse and meet other book-lovers. All are welcome to check out books. The library is also open for self-service during the week.

Get kids moving! by Sue Ames, Parish Nurse

It's probably not a big surprise that the majority of children aren't meeting the national guidelines for physical activity. The Department of Health and Human Services' Physical Activity Guidelines for Americans recommends 60 minutes of daily physical activity for children age 6–17.

In a bulletin insert published in July, 2016, by Advocate Health Care, Dr. Vipul Singla, a pediatrician on staff at Advocate Children's Hospital in Park Ridge, IL, says that kids are more likely to participate in exercise when they can choose an activity they enjoy. "Not everyone likes sports, and often, we think of sports as the only option for physical activity. Biking, walking your dog, roller skating or rollerblading are all great ways to be active," says Dr. Singla. He offers these tips:

Make time for activity. Parents want their kids to succeed and, understandably, schedule lots of study time, music classes and other extracurricular activities, but often don't do the same with exercise. Help them make time for physical activity by planning it.

Turn off the screen(s). The American Academy of Pediatrics recommends children and teens should engage with entertainment media for no more than one or two hours per day.

Lead by example. Children who see their parents having fun being active are more likely to participate themselves. Play sports, ride bikes, be active with your child.

Give the gift of activity. For birthdays and holidays, suggest that family and friends bring gifts that encourage outdoor activities, such as balls, jump ropes and other active toys.

Remind children to drink plenty of water when they're active. Getting enough sleep is important, too.

Here are some fun and active ideas to try this summer:

- Go to the playground/park.
- Move to GoNoodle videos on YouTube (for that occasional rainy day).
- Walk with a pedometer and make counting steps a game with goals and rewards.

• Sign the whole family up for the Grace summer walking program

- Swim at the pool or beach.
- Roller skate.
- Dance-athon.
- Go on a nature walk.
- Take a walk at the zoo.
- Climb stairs—make it a competition.
- Have a scavenger hunt around your neighborhood.



• Ride bikes. Ride to church on Walk/Wheel to Worship Sundays.

• Chase lightning bugs and see how many you can catch in an hour.

- Climb a sand dune
- Plant a garden and care for it.

I'm sure that parents and kids together can think of many more fun ideas to add to the list! Summer is here and we are so blessed with long hours of warm sunshine. Explore the beauty God surrounds us with!

Feedback from A Conversation on Racism

The small group conversations on racism at Grace were very successful. The first phase of the journey concluded at the end of April with a potluck dinner, discussion, and an opportunity for participants to offer their feedback. The Faith Perspectives team would like to share a general summary of the feedback.

The book

"Waking up White," by Debby Irving, anchored the group discussions and was met with mixed reviews. Most found the author's degree of candor and vulnerability helpful and permission-giving for their own journey; others found her overly broad assumptions distracting or even damaging to her case. Some participants said they would have preferred to read a book on racism with a specifically Christian lens.

Response from Faith Perspectives team: Indeed it was very difficult to choose just one book for the beginning of our conversation on racism here at Grace. There are many voices and many perspectives on the subject. We did not expect the book to land with everyone involved in the discussions. We are very thankful, however, that those who indicated their dissatisfaction were insistent that we continue the discussion with additional voices. We do intend to continue – both with additional voices and with opportunities to express our desire for reconciliation and social justice. This book and discussion were the first, even if awkward step in the conversation – not the last.

The small groups

The small group setting for these conversations was a resounding success and was highly rated by everyone who participated.

Many people shared their gratitude for an opportunity to meet other Grace members with whom they weren't acquainted. Citing various reasons, some respondents said that the groups fells short as a place for "open and honest conversation"; the book, study guide, or fragile interpersonal relationships were a barrier for them.

Response from Pastor Dave Wegner: A framework for small groups is critical for a congregation the size of Grace. We are thrilled that many participants built new and strengthened old relationships with other members of the community. There will always be factors at play that make intentional and open sharing difficult. Our challenge as a church community, then, is to continue living into our unity as the body of Christ while creating space for our diversity of opinions.

Next steps

There are many recommendations from participants on how we can take the next steps on this journey: reaffirming relationships with Harmony Community Church, becoming better aware of community organizing and reconciliation opportunities, learning from additional books or speakers from various backgrounds, hearing from a specifically Christian perspective, and other ideas were lifted up.

The Faith Perspectives Team is currently considering other resources and events in which the Grace community may take part. We will use the quieter summer months to plan for next steps in our Conversation on Racism. You may read more about how to participate in local peace and justice events in the Weekly Announcements distributed on Sunday mornings.

Please continue to share with us ways in which you see racism being discussed or addressed in your daily living.
